Society presents Solution for Gaelic Road Signs

The Scottish Executive is to spend £3 million on erecting road signs in both Gaelic and English on trunk roads in the Highlands of Scotland, a move which had been advocated by supporters of the language. But some on Highlands Council are unconvinced by the need for the bilingual signs and argue that many roads are in poor condition and the cash should be spent on repairs instead. Others on the Council welcomed the development, saying that it would let visitors "know they are entering Gaidhealtachd" (land of the Gaels) and it promotes the Gaelic culture and language to all. Indeed, some would like to see Anglicised

Gaelic words removed and replaced with Gaelic originals. That might pose a problem, however, for the 98.8% of the rest of the population of Scotland who don't speak Gaelic and have difficulty with its pronunciation. *Rampant Scotland.com* The Society's Gaelic classes started on January 7 at the Confederation Park +55 Activity Centre, 2212—13th Street NW, meeting every Tuesday at 6:45 pm. The Declaration of

A suggestion that the Declaration of Arbroath should be displayed in its place of origin as part of the 700th anniversary of its signing in 2020, has been rejected by the Keeper of the Records of Scotland. He says that a trip to Arbroath could endanger the ancient manuscript. The Declaration is a letter (in Latin) to the Pope from eight earls and 31 barons of Scotland asking him, in rousing terms, to acknowledge Scotland as an independent nation and to reject the claims of the English king. The document was exhibited in the new Scottish Parliament building in recent years, but that exercise was described as a "severe engineering and conservation problem." There is a danger that the wax seals and tags could become detached, despite its specially designed case.
