

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Curling Bonspiel

One of the Society's objectives is to promote and sustain Scottish cultural activities, which includes the game of curling. Canada is seen as one of the top counties in the world at this sport, and it is immensely popular at all ages. It seems appropriate that the Society encourage members to get involved in this Scottish-Canadian pastime. The first recognized Curling Clubs were formed in Scotland, and during the 19th Century the game was "exported" wherever Scots settled around the world in cold climates, most notably at that time in Canada, USA, Sweden, Switzerland, Norway and New Zealand.



The first Rules were drawn up in Scotland, and they were formally adopted as the "Rules in Curling" by the Grand Caledonian Curling Club, which was formed in Edinburgh in 1838 and became the sport's governing body. The Society is working with Calgary Curling Club to hold a LEARN TO CURL event toward the end of the season, likely a weekend in March. The event would consist of on-ice coaching from CCC, to learn (or improve on) the proper technique of throwing a curling stone and some coaching on the strategy of playing a couple of ends. In order to book weekend ice-time and an available coach, we need to gauge the interest of our members. I appreciate it is difficult without a specific date, but would ask you to register your interest so that we can arrange the event. The event would be free to members and open to friends or family members who would be charged the appropriate fee for joining the Society. The Society's Annual Burns Dinner for the Homeless will take place on Sunday January 19 2014 at the Calgary Drop-In and Rehabilitation Centre, 423 – 4th Avenue S.E. Please feel free to wear your plaid. Car pooling is suggested and a map will be



provided. Volunteers should arrive at 10:30 a.m. and proceed to the 6th floor to get settled into work groups. We require people to kitchen serve and table serve. The DI staff will direct the kitchen serving. This is a funday, we begin the morning's activities with the kitchen helpers going down to set up the kitchen. Then the entertainers go down to start the Robbie Burns Show at 11:30 a.m. The show consists of piping, singing, highland dancing, poetry reading and the Address to the Haggis. Once the address is finished, the entertainers are piped to the kitchen and the serving begins. It takes about 40 minutes and we serve 900 plus people depending on the weather and...

2014 Society Scotland Tour

The Society has been approached by Collette Vacations who are offering a Discover Scotland tour for 2014. Ryan Mikucki will be presenting a full 10 day plan at the Society's Budget Meeting (see above) for member consideration. Day 1 is the overnight flight; Days 2 & 3 are in Edinburgh; Day 4 goes to St. Andrews, Pitlochry & Grantown-on-Spey; Day 5 is Grantown to Thurso; Day 6 Thurso to the Orkneys; Day 7 Thurso to Loch Ness & Ballachulish; Day 8 Ballachulish to Skye and back; Day 9 Ballachulish to Erskine; Day 10 Erskine.



Currently, the start dates to be considered are: 15 May, 9 June, 16 June, 7 July and 11 August and while it would be great to go as a full group, some may find that one start date works better for them, as in the case of student summer vacation and interest in the Commonwealth Games or Edinburgh Tattoo. As a group larger than 15, we would receive one free member and the savings would be a reduction spread over the whole group. Early booking would have an additional reduction and require a \$250 deposit which would not be refundable within 6 months of the departure date. Full payment would be required 2 months before departure. The tour is open to non-members of the Society and please note that air fares do rise for the summer months. Mobile Burns Unit

Members who are interested in performing on Robbie Burns Day, Friday, 24 January 2014 at seniors' lodges and nursing homes around Calgary should contact Robert Henderson at roberthenderson@yahoo.com or (403) 245-5514. The day starts at about 9:30am with two or perhaps three troupes travelling around the city visiting between six and seven lodges each. The show consists of two highland dances, two songs or poems, including the Address to the Haggis, and a piping selection. The Society rents the vans to travel around and pays for the gas, but will need a driver, who is usually the singer, and everyone meets at the car rental office. The group usually performs two or three shows before lunch, which the Society sponsors, and three or four shows in the afternoon. We are looking for pipers, singers, poetry readers and highland dancers. In 2012, two Mobile Burns Units performed at a total of 10 locations for about 500 people and was well received everywhere they went.
