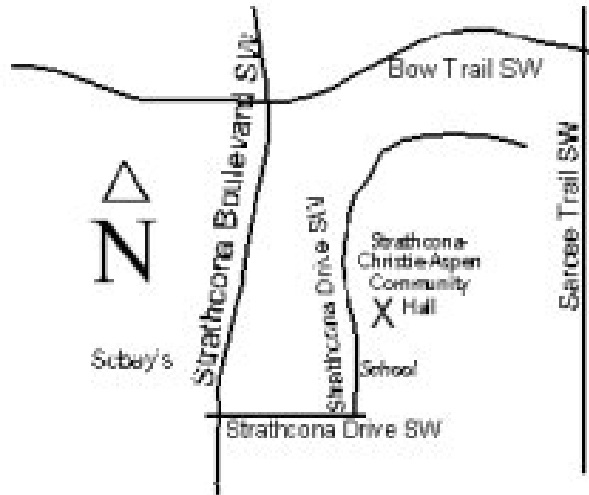
Annual General Meeting

Board Member Openings

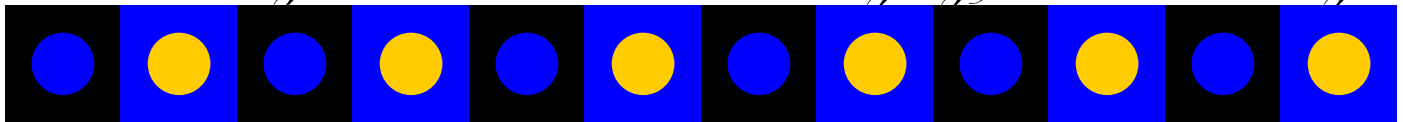
