Mobile Burns 2017

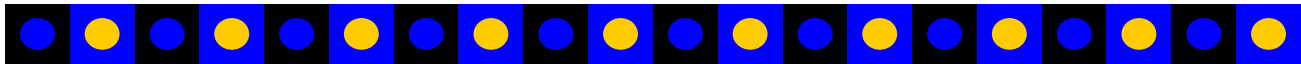
