

John Tamson's Bairns

Article from the Calgary Tribune, Wednesday, December 7, 1892

On Wednesday, the members of St. Andrew's Society celebrated their anniversary by a ball in the new Masonic hall, Barber Block. The hall is an elegant one, and was warm and comfortable, and not withstanding the unfavorable weather about 83, or 40 couples responded to the invitations sent out. The hall was very prettily decorated with mottoes, etc, and the floor, although new, was well waxed and made pleasant for the dancers. While the guests were assembling, Mr Dewar, the society's piper, warmed the hearts and feelings of his "brither Scots" with the music of the pipes. About 9:30 the Calgary Orchestra struck up music for the lancers, and henceforth the dances followed in regular succession up to midnight, when a skirl of the pipes announced supper and the company started for the dining room belonging to the hall where Mr.Butcher, of the Bodega restaurant, had an elegant spread prepared that would tempt the appetite of the epicure. After supper dancing was resumed, and it was nearly two o'clock when the programme was finished. The ball was certainly one of the most enjoyable held in Calgary for a long time, and the society are to

be congratulated on providing such a choice evening's enjoyment for their friends an the anniversary day of their patron saint. A pleasing feature of the evening was the presence of a number of the Sons of England, inclusive of their president, and also descendants of the Emerald Isle, and never, we may say, did the Shamrock, Rose, and Thistle, entwined by the Maple Leaf, blend more happily together than on Wednesday. While the whole committee were attentive to the wants of the guests, the Major Stewart, secretary Mr. president. McGregor and Mr. James Waugh were particularly so. During the evening fraternal greetings were exchanged with sister societies in Montreal, Vancouver, Winnipeg, Regina and other places. Mr. Brisco of the Alberta tannery particularly distinguished himself and showed some of the Scotchmen present how Highland dances could be executed.

The music of the orchestra was of the usual high class, although the accompaniment of a piano was much missed.

The Ball was held Wednesday, 30 November 1892, tickets were \$3 for gentleman and 2 ladies; \$2 for single ticket. The 2018 edition of the St. Andrew's Ball will be held Saturday, 24 November at the Polish Canadian Cultural Centre.
