## 75 Years of Scottish Country Dancing in Calgary

At The Society's Executive Meeting, held Tuesday, 22 February 1949, held in the Calgary Herald Board Room, Mrs. J McDermott proposed the formation of a square dancing school. Miss E Rankine made the motion that the Society start a Scottish Square Dancing School. All approved and Calgary's first Scottish Country dancing group was formed. A committee was formed with: Mr. W Marshall, Mr. & Mrs. Jas Smith, Mr. Andrew Mitchell, Mr. J Archer, Mr. Peter Heigh, Mrs. J McDermott, Miss E Rankine, Mrs. J Gray, Mrs James Seller and Miss Nan Irvine. The first Scottish Country Dance Instructor in Calgary was Evelyn Leinweber who was later a founding member of the Royal Scottish Country Dance Society-Calgary Branch.

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## **Burns Night 2024**

The Society's Burns Night was held on Saturday, 27 January 2024 at the Polish Canadian Cultural Centre, with 110 members and friends in attendance. TBefore dinner, the company was entertained by the Society pipers and the Wilson School highland dancers followed by the Society Gaelic Choir. The pipers played in the Haggis which was ably addressed by Andrew Auchterlonie, the Society Treasurer. A three course buffet dinner followed which included haggis, roast beef and chicken. The Immortal Memory was presented by Malcolm

Stewart which included a reference to Bob Dylan, the Toast to the Lassies by David Aftergood based on Maple Syrup, and a clever Reply by Margot Aftergood. This was followed by an evening of Scottish Country dancing to the music of the Scott Duncan Trio which was well received. The Society began this event in Calgary in 1886, and the tradition continues with one of the City's oldest cultural functions.



### Kilt Skate 2024

An amazing 10<sup>th</sup> Annual Calgary Kilt Skate was held on Sunday February 11<sup>th</sup>. The weather was perfect, sunny and +4C for the annual event that takes place with bare knees on skates on Olympic Plaza ice in downtown Calgary. This year again, we were part of the Calgary Chinook Blast Winter Festival, which provided excellent stage and audio experiences for the public. As in previous years, we had the Society's St. Andrews Caledonian Choir, under the extremely capable direction of Bethanne Friesen start off the festivities with a wonderful ren-



dition of O'Canada in Gaelic and English. This was followed by several favorite Scottish song selections. We were also treated to a wonderful exhibition of highland dancing by dancers from the Wendy Wilson's School of Highland Dancing. The dances were expertly accompanied by our Society president and renowned local piper, Robert Henderson. Thereafter, the Scottish Society pipers played a selection of pipe songs that included a popular rendition of Amazing Grace.

There were lots of Kilt Škaters whirling around the Olympic Plaza ice as over 150 cups of Tim Hortons Hot Chocolate and Timbits were served to the skaters.

Finally, we had some good local media coverage of the event including City TV news, Global news and the Calgary Herald, who showed up to take picture and publish them for public distribution.

## The Society's Winter Cèilidh Dance 2024

On the evening of the 24th of February, the Society held its inaugural ceilidh dance of 2024! The event took place in the main hall of the Capitol Hill Community Centre.

Doors opened to the public at 6.30pm, the dancing itself commenced at 7pm and lasted till 10pm, and the venue closed at 11pm. The dance went exceedingly well, and several members and friends of the Society were instrumental to the evening's success. Members Robert Earl and Ann Vanderwhal worked the bar and managed the event booking, respectively; members Adam Dahmer and Dhanya Baird taught, walked, and called the various cèilidh dances; and the musician's collective, Prairie Flower (members of which are frequent performers at other Society events), served as the live dance band for the event. On this occasion, the featured musicians included Erin McCullogh, the band leader, on guitar; Gayla Roberts, on bòdhran; and Kat Kerr, on fiddle. In the course of the evening, the callers led ten dances: the Gay Gordons, the Dashing White Sergeant, the Virginia Reel, the St. Bernard's Waltz, the Canadian Barn Dance, the Riverside Jig, the Flying Scotsman, the Spanish Waltz, the Orcadian Strip the Willow, and Auld Lang Syne (with a subsequent free -style polka). Most of the dancers danced every dance that was called, and at no point aside from intermissions were there fewer than sixteen dancers on the dance floor. The attendees were overwhelmingly positive and the Society will continue its ceilidh dance program in the summer! Adam Dahmer
