Cranachan

This is a popular Scottish dessert and there are many variations and names such as Cream Crowdie.

Cranachan Ingredients: 3 oz (half cup) pinhead or coarse oatmeal Half pint double cream 1 tablespoon Drambuie (optional) Method:

Toast the oatmeal in a frying pan on a high heat until lightly brown. Whisk the cream into a soft consistency and mix in the oatmeal and Drambuie (alternatively, use a few drops vanilla essence or other flavouring of your choice). Serve in tall glasses. A popular variation is to mix in 60z (one and a half cups) of fresh raspberries. Or use vanilla ice cream instead of cream. *Thanks to Rampant Scotland*

£15,000 For Oldest Whis-

A bottle of whisky, which experts believe is the oldest in existence, was sold at auction in 2006 for £14,850. The unusually small bottle of "Glenavon Special Liqueur Whisky" is believed to have been bottled between 1851 and when the distillery ceased operation, at the Glenavon Distillery in Ballindolloch, Banffshire. The bottle contains only 14 fluid ounces (about 400ml compared to the more usual 700ml of today). Glenavon stopped operating in 1858 prior to a consolidation on a site not far away, which later became the present Glenlivet Distillery. There were bids from as far away as the Far East and the US and it eventually went to an anonymous bidder.
